I recently celebrated my two year anniversary as Director of Jacob's Heart. Reflecting on the last 24 months my emotions run the gamut - from pride and happiness, to outrage and tears.

We have achieved so much during this time. We have expanded our Spanish language program in Salinas, created a teen group, moved into our new office, strengthened our staff as a team, commemorated the completion of treatment for many kids, celebrated countless birthdays, and provided support to more than 100 families.

Since 2002, eight young lives in our family have been lost to cancer or related illness. It is a daily struggle to digest and accept the profound effect of childhood cancer in our community. While at times it is difficult to not allow anger to overcome us, our staff and volunteers are steadfast, strong and compassionate in the provision of support.

It is clear to me that we are part of a community that cares deeply.

In February, we will celebrate our sixth anniversary. I am grateful to be a part of the rich history that the children, families, staff, board, volunteers, and supporters of Jacob's Heart have created. Ours is a history that, at its heart, is written in the language of love.

End of Treatment: A New Journey

The last day of treatment! From the time of diagnosis, patients and their families look forward to this day with the expectation that it will signal a return to normal life. However, as the end of treatment draws near, many people find that their joyful anticipation is mixed with fear at losing the safety net of active treatment. It is normal to feel ambivalent and a bit anxious when your child's treatment ends.

Your doctor can make this transition off treatment easier by scheduling a meeting with you and your medical team. This is an opportunity to discuss any concerns you have and to create a follow-up plan. Some possible concerns to discuss could include long term effects of treatment; issues involved in returning to school; signs of relapse and future health insurance needs. The hospital staff is aware that most people have questions about what to expect after treatment ends and are willing to help in any way possible.

Your child may also feel some insecurity about the end of treatment. Trips to the hospital and interaction with the medical staff have become the norm and there may be a sense of loss when this familiar routine changes. This anxiety may manifest in different ways depending on the child's age and developmental stage.

Many families have a ceremony to mark the end of treatment. This is a good way to help young children understand that the active phase of treatment is really over. A party or family vacation is a good way to celebrate. Other ways to note the day could include writing thank you notes and taking pictures of the hospital staff; flushing all the leftover pills away; having family and friends send "Congratulations" cards. Any event that helps to acknowledge this special day will be remembered for a lifetime.

I look up in the sky and at all the beautiful things surrounding me. I think how lucky I am to be here savoring all these lovely things. I spend time with people who make me feel good about myself and who make me smile. Some of my favorite people to be around are my mother, Stanzy, Brittany, my grandma, and all the people at Jacob's Heart.

I go to my mom when I am sad because she is so supportive and she always makes me feel good about myself. When I start to think more negatively I go talk to my grandma. She helps me see the positive in even the worst of situations. When I need some cheering up or a smile I go to Stanzy, Brittany, and all the people at Jacob's Heart.

Another thing I do to make myself feel better is read a funny poem, book, or I watch a funny, feel good movie. Two books that always cheer me up are *My Cup Runneth Over* by Cherry

Whytock and *Feeling Sorry for Celia* by Jaclyn Moriarty. Some movies that always make me smile are *Legally Blond*, *Freaky Friday*, *Corky Romano* and *Hairspray*. Here is one of my favorite poems that always brings a smile to my face. Its called *Crazy Dream*, from the book *falling Up* by Shel Silverstein (see sidebar).

Marlene Gilbert: At the Heart of Jacob's Heart

I recently had the pleasure of interviewing Jacob's Heart's Marlene Gilbert. As I made my way through my list of questions I learned not only about Marlene and her role at Jacob's Heart but also what it means to be involved with families who are fighting to save the lives of their children.

Marlene is the Director of the Counseling Program. She oversees programs in both English and Spanish. Starting as a volunteer about five-and-a-half years ago, she has been at Jacob's Heart since its infancy. She has helped the organization grow from holding support meetings at Fresh Choice before they had office space, to running six different groups in the English-speaking program.

Marlene brought to Jacob's Heart not only the experience of counseling families with chronically ill children, but also first-hand knowledge of what it was like to go through the harsh treatments of cancer with her own child.

Her son, Tom, lost his life in 1989 to an aggressive form of leukemia after three years of treatment. It was this experience that led her to pursue a degree from Santa Clara University and earn her marriage and family counseling license. "I always wanted to work with families with children who were chronically ill." When Marlene found Jacob's Heart all the pieces fell magically into place.

Running groups for five years has given Marlene the opportunity to work with families from diagnosis through the two-and-a-half to three years of treatment, through relapses and remissions and readjustments to school. She has been there for the post-treatment celebrations and for the grieving parents who have lost their children.

I asked Marlene what it is like helping parents and children through the most painful experience of their lives. "That's the hard part. But I think the fact that I have been through it gives me more credibility. The main thing is that I know that they are going to be okay. I know that people can get through this. They can get through the treatment. They can get through the loss of a child. It changes someone just like going through the cancer treatment changes someone, but it can be done. And I think that's where the credibility comes in. Because I can say I've been there. I've done it. You can do it too. And that gives them hope."

Marlene believes much of the benefit of the groups comes from simply bringing people together. "We provide the place and invite the families to come. And they really help each other through this. The peer support is probably the most important thing we do."

The rewards of working at Jacob's Heart are plentiful. "The work that I am doing gives meaning to my son's life. If I can take this experience and use it in a way that helps people and makes a difference in the world, it comforts

Joining Hands with Central Coast VNA to Support Families

When a child is diagnosed with cancer, myriad issues come up for the family. Medical issues need to be addressed, such as treatment options and caring for the child at home. Psychological issues come up, not just for the child affected by cancer, but for the child's family, friends and support system as well "What should we expect? How will we get to our treatment appointments? How will this affect our other children?" All of this happens on top of the weight of a cancer diagnosis.

Jacob's Heart and the Central Coast Visiting Nurses Association are working together to provide stronger and more comprehensive support to families facing a battle with cancer. While the collaboration between the two organizations is informal in its present state, Margy Mayfield, Pediatrics/OB Clinical Supervisor for the CCVNA says, "We are hoping [the collaboration] will become official."

The CCVNA's pediatric program offers in home nursing care to oncology patients from ages 0-21 within Monterey, Santa Clara and San Benito counties. The VNA nursing staff comes into the home to help the child and their families get acquainted with the medical equipment - such as a central line - and procedures - such as medication schedules - that will be a large part of the family's life for the coming months.

Meanwhile, the VNA staff may mention Jacob's Heart to the family. There is a lot for a family to process in the days following a cancer diagnosis and as the VNA's Mayfield says, "Sometimes the families can process it, sometimes they can't." Getting involved with Jacob's Heart early on can help ease a family's burden through counseling, support services and direct financial assistance.

As time goes on and the family begins treatment they often run into other families who are going through a similar experience. Oftentimes, the families are involved with Jacob's Heart and will talk about the special support they receive.

"It's an infectious organization," says Mayfield. "There is a wonderful strength and support about them."

Joana deBelkadi, Jacob's Heart's Bilingual Program Coordinator, relates how she works closely with one of VNA's dedicated nurses, Matt. "How we ended up coordinating is simple, because I had heard so much about him from many of my families," she relates. "And evidently he had heard about me from the same families."

When a family receives help from both VNA and Jacob's Heart they are getting support from every angle. VNA and Jacob's Heart can share information, as certain medical issues may trigger emotional issues for the child and their families.

If she knows what the family will soon be facing, Joana can help the family prepare for the coming weeks. "It helps that Matt and I know each other personally now. We exchange information which helps us provide more

me and I think it honors his memory." Additionally, "Jacob's Heart is a really fun place to work. We're always having parties! I get to do things with kids that I never would do. So, even though my one child was taken away, I've been given a hundred children to care for."

Working with Jacob's Heart families also keeps her close to what's really important in this life. "It keeps me grounded. It keeps me focused on real life. And that has enhanced my personal life so this job has given me back ten times anything I have given to Jacob's Heart, because it has given me faith in the human spirit. It's just amazing the way the families and the children are able to get through day by day, through trips to the hospital, through painful procedures and all of the side effects of chemotherapy. And they do it in a way that is filled with courage and strength.

For Marlene, the hardest part of the job is that she can't be everywhere all of the time. "There just aren't enough hours in the day." She knows she's very fortunate to have a job that gives her enthusiasm, passion and endless rewards of spirit. Certainly Jacob's Heart is very fortunate to have Marlene. The resonance of her heart echoes strongly at the organization's core, improving the quality of life for children with cancer and easing the burdens of their families.

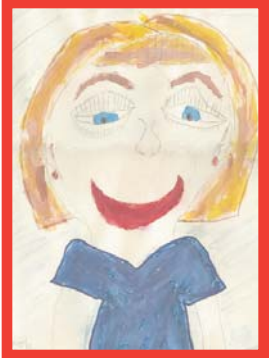


We Care About Kids with Cancer

When a child has cancer, it affects the entire family and, sometimes, a whole community. Jacob's Heart's community awareness program aims to inform the public on the emotional, physical and social effects of childhood cancer. As part of this effort, we have assembled photo essays and a children's art exhibit entitled "Treasures from Within" which show the many faces of cancer.

The following is the text from one of our exhibits, 12 accompanying photos further tell this family's story.



Our daughter Madison was diagnosed with cancer at five months old. The support we received from our community was overwhelming. We went from a two-income family to a one-income family overnight. After our first week at Stanford Children's Hospital, we came home to find our refrigerator full, our house clean, and our friends eager to help with whatever was needed.

Our family was unique to the hospital staff, not because Madison had two moms, but because of the steady stream of visitors we received. The staff had never witnessed such support for one family before. Every challenge we faced was met with incredible love and generosity. We received gift cards for gas and food. Dinners were organized by friends. Swimming at Polly's puddle and our trip to

Self-Portrait: Mickey from the Disneyland were very special to us. Our counselor, our hairdresser, Treasures from Within Exhibit and Maddy's healer all donated their time. Co-workers donated six months of their own sick days, which enabled both of us to be with Madison full-time.

Having a child with cancer can paralyze a family. Because of our community we stayed in motion. Our friends and family carried us through and never let us fall. By helping with our most basic needs, they gave us the chance to focus on what really mattered – every moment with our daughter. Our thanks to everyone who was part of our lives; you made such a difference.
